A Summary of Butterfly Sightings in the London Borough of Bexley 2017 (Issue no. 1)

On the basis of somewhat Limited Data (Records), we are able to identify 'First Sightings' of Butterflies seen in the London Borough of Bexley during 2017 (to 8 April) as follows:

Brimstone ~ first seen on 2 March in the Lamorbey Park area

Comma ~ first seen on 9 March in Braeburn Park

Green Hairstreak ~ first seen on 6 April beside the Thames Path in the Belvedere area



Green-Veined White ~ first seen on 27 March beside Norman Road North

Holly Blue ~ first seen on 2 April in the Lamorbey Park area

Orange-Tip ~ first seen on 28 March in the Crossness Nature Reserve and Surrounding area

Peacock ~ first seen on 9 March in Braeburn Park, beside the Thames Path in the Erith area and Lesnes Abbey Park/Woods

Red Admiral ~ first seen on 20 January in Sidcup High Street

Small Tortoiseshell ~ first seen on 24 February in the Grounds at Hall Place

Small White ~ first seen on 11 March beside a Public Footpath in the Erith area

Speckled Wood ~ first seen on 15 March in Foots Cray Meadows

The following Table shows the Highest (Confirmed) Recorded Counts per Species any one Site on any one Day as at 31 March:

Brimstone: 9 Butterflies in the Crossness Nature Reserve and Surrounding area on 30 March

Comma: 10 Butterflies in the Crossness Nature Reserve and Surrounding area on 30 March

Green-Veined White *: 5 Butterflies in the Crossness Nature Reserve and Surrounding area on 30 March

Orange-Tip: 9 Butterflies in the Crossness Nature Reserve and Surrounding area on 30 March



Peacock: 27 Butterflies in the Crossness Nature Reserve and Surrounding area on 30 March

Red Admiral: just a single Butterfly in various locations

Small Tortoiseshell: 'at least' 8 in the Thames Road Wetlands on 15 March

Small White *: 5 Butterflies in the Crossness Nature Reserve and Surrounding area on 28 March

Speckled Wood: 3 Butterflies in the Crossness Nature Reserve and Surrounding area on 30 March

* It must be borne in mind that due to difficulties in differentiating these Butterflies when in flight &c. (by us at least) the figures shown represent minimums and the actual figures will be very much Higher.
